## INDOOR BASEBALL RULES

The following Indoor Baseball Rules have been officially adopted by the Toronto Garrison Officers' Indoor Baseball League.

1. The rules of regulation baseball as officially adopted by the National and American Leagues annually shall govern the game except as follows:

2. No gloves may be used by any player except the catcher.

3. The pitcher must deliver the ball from below the hip, the arms parallel with the body, and only one step may be taken in the delivery.

4. A dead ball shall not be called a ball and the batter will not take his base. Base runners will return to their base on a dead ball.

5. Base runners must hold their bases until the ball delivered by the pitcher has crossed the home plate. They must not start to steal while the pitcher has the ball in his position.

6. If a base runner leaves his base too soon he will be declared out.

7. The Balk rule of hard ball shall be rescinded.

8. A foul tip shall come as under the hard ball rules.

9. A third strike shall come as under the hard ball rules.

10. Overthrows to first, third bases and home plate or passed ball entitle the runners to one base only, providing they can make it. An uncaught strike shall be the same as a passed ball.

11. Any batted ball striking west end gallery, railing or below and rebounding into the field of play, will be played out whether caught or not, the batter making as many bases as possible while the ball is being fielded. Any batted ball lighting in the gallery after having cleared the railing shall be a home run, whether it rebounds into the field of play or not.

12. Any fair batted ball hit into north or south gallery shall entitle the batter to two bases.

13. If first and second or first, second and third base be occupied and the batter hits an infield fly, the batter is out provided less than two be out at the time.

14. A batted ball striking the rafters and bouncing back into the infield must light fair and stay fair to be called a fair ball. In the outfield it will be a fair ball if it lights in fair territory, no matter where it rolls.

15. Professional coaches shall not sit on the bench with the players or direct or advise in any way during the progress of the game.

16. Two coaches may be used at all times and no smoking will be allowed in the coacher's box.

17. Any batted ball hit into the rafters or shades on the lights so that the same does not come within the reach of a player before losing its momentum shall be a dead ball.

18. Any fair batted ball hit into the south entrance of the Armouries shall entitle the batter and base runners to two bases only, providing they can make it.

19. The first game must be called at 8 p.m., when the visiting team will be given the floor for five minutes practice, to be followed by a similar five minute period for the home team, and the game itself must start at 8.10 p.m. irrespective of the number of players then on hand; provided, however, that if either team fails to field nine men by the beginning of the fourth inning, the game will be forfeited to the other team. In the event of both teams failing to field nine men, by the beginning of the fourth inning, the game shall count as a loss to both teams.

Similarly, the second game will be called immediately the first game is over with each team being allowed five minutes practice, and second game must start ten minutes after the end of the first game, with the same provision as to the number of players in the game by the beginning of the fourth inning.
